

What Research Supports Our Work

Research has shown that there are **Seven Key Principles** to support effective delivery of early intervention supports and services for your child:

One

Infants and toddlers learn best through everyday experiences and interactions with familiar people in familiar contexts.

Two

All families, with the necessary supports and resources, can enhance their children's learning and development.

Three

The primary role of an interventionist in early intervention is to work with, coach and support family members and caregivers in children's lives.

Four

The early intervention process, from initial contacts through transition, must be dynamic and individualized to reflect family members' learning styles and cultural beliefs and practices.

Five

Service plan outcomes must be functional and based on children's and families' needs and family-identified priorities.

Six

The family's priorities, needs, and interests are addressed most appropriately by a primary interventionist who represents and receives team and community support.

Seven

Interventions with young children and family members must be based on explicit principles, validated practices, best available research, and relevant laws and regulations.



Who We Are

The Resource Exchange Early Intervention Program (TRE-EI) is a regional early intervention and family support program serving El Paso, Park and Teller counties. Our goal is to coach and support families with infants and toddlers to age three who have developmental delays.



What We Do

TRE-EI provides thoughtful and professional coordination of available services, supports and resources for your entire family, based on the needs of your individual child and the priorities and interests of your family.

Developing the relationship between your child and family with the TRE-EI service coordinator is the first step in accessing TRE-EI services and other available resources and supports in the community.

Depending on the individual needs of your child and family, this team may include:

- Physical therapist
- Occupational therapist
- Speech-language pathologist
- Early childhood special educator/ Developmental Interventionist
- Early childhood mental health professional
- Autism specialist
- Teacher of the visually impaired
- Teacher of the deaf or hard of hearing




How We Work to Implement Effective Early Intervention

Your primary service provider will ensure that all developmental needs for your child are addressed effectively, based on your families' priorities. You and your primary service provider are supported by a full team of professionals.

Working closely with your entire family, we find the most appropriate resources to deliver the best possible outcomes for your child.
