TRE to host adaptive car-building event for children at SCHEELS Colorado Springs

Four area toddlers will receive brand new wheels that help them make developmental strides

The Resource Exchange (TRE) will be back on the road with its unique and fun, GoBabyGo! event, Friday, March 10th! Build teams of therapists, technicians, and volunteers will assemble and customize four miniature ride-on motorized cars designed to give increased mobility to area toddlers with developmental disabilities or delays who cannot walk unassisted.

WHAT: The Resource Exchange Go Baby Go! "Build Day"

WHEN: Friday, March 10, 2023

10:00 AM-11:30 AM: Parents will decorate the cars, and therapists will make final modifications to the small, motorized cars built that morning by volunteers before the children take them for a spin. The best

- TRE therapists incorporate the vehicle into the child's ongoing personalized development plan to help the child meet developmental milestones and explore the world around them in new ways.
